Dear Judge Brammer:

Without my knowledge or permission, my name appeared, along side my wife's name and with a number of other names, on an invitation to a political fundraiser for a congressional candidate in violation of Canon 5. The invitation (attached) does not designate my title or reference my relationship with the courts.

My wife offered her name to support the event and thought she made it clear that my name was not to be used. Despite our best efforts to heed the advice in Judicial Ethics Advisory Committee Opinion 03-05, this mistake occurred. When my wife and I vehemently complained to the campaign, we were told that my name was "inadvertently listed." I have attached an e-mail message from the candidate explaining the mistake and promising that "it would not happen again."

I deeply regret this mistake and am embarrassed. As soon as I received a copy of the invitation in the mail, I immediately contacted Keith Stott. He recommended that I send this letter to you.
