ORDER

The commission learned that a city magistrate married to an assistant chief of police did not disclose the relationship in traffic cases in which the police department was acting as the prosecutor. After reviewing the judge's response, the commission found insufficient evidence of ethical misconduct. The judge is not obligated to disclose the relationship because her husband works in the administrative division of the police department. Accordingly, the complaint is dismissed pursuant to Rules 16(a) and 23.
