INTRODUCTION

The Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC), Adult Probation Services Division (APSD) oversees the statewide administration of adult probation programs and services in accordance with the statutory and administrative guidelines in Arizona. The APSD interacts with the courts, adult probation departments, and a variety of non-court agencies and organizations throughout the state. The division also administers several major program funds and oversees the case management system used by the probation departments, which is the Adult Probation Enterprise Tracking System (APETS). The APSD consists of four primary units (Interstate Compact, Operations, Programs, and Central Services) and has approximately 20 employees.

The APSD Annual Report is intended to provide members of the public, county adult probation departments, applicable government agencies and legislature, and other interested parties with a status update about adult probation in Arizona and specific APSD initiatives.

The information presented in this report characterizes the adult probation population statewide and initiatives enacted or in progress during FY 2022. When relevant, the present fiscal year is interpreted considering outcomes from prior fiscal years. Data contained in this report are drawn from the APETS system, AOC Court Services, and monthly statistical reports.

APSD UNITS

Central Services

The Central Services Unit is responsible for statistical reporting, data analysis, research, and annual report preparation and publication. This Unit is also responsible for extracting data from and maintaining the case management systems utilized by the Arizona probation departments and providing monthly statistical data. The unit also provides daily technical assistance to probation staff statewide regarding the Drug, Gang, and Violent Crime Control Grant. In addition, the unit provides ongoing support and resources for the pretrial units across the state in their use of the PSA risk assessment tool, through continued training, support, and statewide committees and task forces.

Interstate Compact and Administration

Since October 25, 1995, the AOC has handled the probation administration and supervision of offenders under the Compact and provides daily technical assistance to probation staff statewide. The Interstate Compact for Adult Offender Supervision (ICAOS) monitors probationers transferred to other states, supervises probationers transferred to Arizona, and investigates requests of probationers to transfer probation to Arizona after being sentenced in other states. Local probation departments supervise accepted transferred probationers and collect a statutorily prescribed monthly assessment to the Victim Compensation and Assistance Fund.

Operations

The Operations Unit is committed to collaborating with the 15 county adult probation departments and serving with excellence, transparency, and inclusion. The Operations Unit is responsible for scheduling and conducting routine operational reviews and corresponding report preparation and publication. They provide training and outreach in preparation for the reviews and communicate with the counties during and after the process.

Programs

The Programs Unit is dedicated to strengthening Arizona's statewide probation system by working together with county probation departments to advance programs, encourage best practices, and improve policies based on relevant data. Relationships are key for the Programs Unit as it engages in partnerships with stakeholders to minimize the duplication of efforts and to enhance the services and resources for those in the system. By pursuing research proven methods from around the nation and collecting specific statewide data, the unit develops standards, guidelines, and training to ensure probation departments are provided the valuable working tools to perform their duties most efficiently.

Arizona Probation Supervision

The 15 county adult probation departments in Arizona are: Apache, Cochise, Coconino, Gila, Graham, Greenlee, La Paz, Maricopa, Mohave, Navajo, Pima, Pinal, Santa Cruz, Yavapai, and Yuma. Seven are combined adult and juvenile departments and eight are bifurcated with separate adult and juvenile departments. Adult probation departments oversee intensive probation supervision (IPS), standard probation supervision (SPS), and administrative supervision populations.

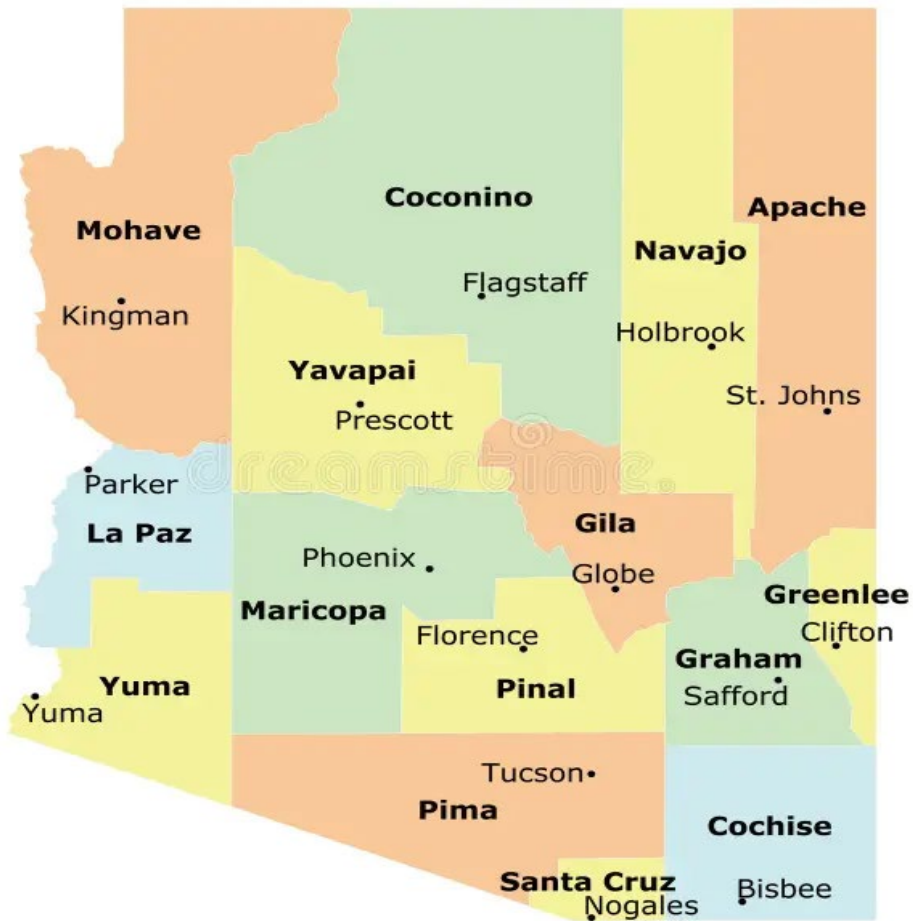

SAFE COMMUNITIES:

- Probation Revocations
 - **56.5% reduction** from FY 2008 base line to FY 2022 in **probationers** who were **revoked to prison**
 - Based on the statewide cost avoidance of \$6,112,720.95 for FY 2022, an appropriation of \$2,445,088.381 (based on reduction of revocation to prison and new felony convictions).
 - **\$403,575,044.33¹ cost avoidance** to Arizona from FY 2009 to FY 2022 based on a reduction to prison revocations.
 - **6.7% decrease** from FY 2008 base line to FY 2022 in **probationers** who had a **new felony conviction**
 - ¹Cost avoidance presented on the FY2019 and FY2018 Probation Fact Sheets incorrectly overstated the avoidance amounts





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
