ORDER

The complainant alleged a superior court commissioner improperly took action on his case after a disqualification motion was filed.

The responsibility of the Commission on Judicial Conduct is to impartially determine if the commissioner engaged in conduct that violated the provisions of Article 6.1 of the Arizona Constitution or the Code of Judicial Conduct and, if so, to take appropriate disciplinary action. The purpose and authority of the commission is limited to this mission.

After review, the commission found no evidence of ethical misconduct and concluded that the commissioner did not violate the Code in this case. Accordingly, the complaint is dismissed in its entirety, pursuant to Rules 16(a) and 23.

On I filed moved to disqualify Judge for reason of bias. I attached to the motion the required affidavit. Per my usual practice, I hand-delivered a courtesy copy of the motion and affidavit to Judge chambers, leaving them with a clerk on the 9th floor of the court house.

Under A.R.S. 12-409, once an affidavit is filed, the judge is required "at once" to transfer the matter to another judge. Under well-settled Arizona case law, once the affidavit is filed, the trial judge has "no power or discretion except to order trial before another judge." Del Castillo v. Wells, 22 Ariz. App. 41, 43, 523 P.2d 92, 94 (1974).

The order to appear issued by Judge places him in violation of A.R.S. 12-409 and violates the Arizona Code of Judicial Conduct, including Rules 1.2 and 2.2.
