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**ORDER**

Complainant alleged unprofessional and biased statements by a municipal court judge pro tem responding to a questionnaire as a prospective juror, including the judge's statement that victims cannot be trusted to tell the truth.

The role of the Commission on Judicial Conduct is to impartially determine whether a judicial officer has engaged in conduct that violates the Arizona Code of Judicial Conduct or Article 6.1 of the Arizona Constitution. There must be clear and convincing evidence of such a violation in order for the Commission to take disciplinary action against a judicial officer.

The Commission reviewed all relevant available information and concluded there was not clear and convincing evidence of a violation of the Code. The named judge is a part-time judicial officer as defined under Part D of the Code. The alleged misconduct occurred at a time when the judge was not engaged in any judicial functions, thus depriving the Commission of jurisdiction over the judge's conduct due to the limited application of the Code to Part D judges. The Commission approved sending the judge an advisory letter expressing condemnation of the judge's statements. The complaint is therefore dismissed pursuant to Commission Rules 16(b) and 23(a).

Commission members Roger D. Barton and Joseph C. Kreamer did not participate in the consideration of this matter.

In reviewing the responses, the court and parties observed one concerning response from juror number \_\_\_\_\_ who stated she is the “\_\_\_\_\_”.
